We decorate our gardens and homes and hearts with the lights and tinsel of hope. I want to invite and welcome you to all our Advent and Christmas events. As we *carefully* come together to celebrate that hope, to rejoice in that hope. Whoever you are, wherever you are in life's journey we truly hope you feel most welcome at Meldrum and Bourtie Church. 

Longest Night Service (Blue Christmas)

On Sunday 19 December at 7.00pm we will hold a Longest Night Service at Meldrum Church. The holidays can be a particularly painful time, especially for those who have experienced loss, often stirring up grief in painfully acute ways. As a result, churches around the world have adopted the practice of having a "Blue Christmas" or a "Longest Night" service during the Advent season. In the Northern hemisphere, this service is often observed as close as possible to December 21st, the Winter Solstice,

the longest night of the year.

This service is designed to provide space for prayer, reflection, and remembrance amidst the holiday hustle and bustle. The empty seats at home are felt more than ever at this time of year. And in this extended pandemic season of life, grief and loss will be magnified and nearly universal. Wherever you are in grief and loss, mourning the death of a loved one or a broken relationship, the distance too far or the pain buried deep, come, and let this service be a space of calm, quiet and healing for you.

Food Bank Appeal

As you know the last year or so has been very hard for many families and the Food Bank has experienced greatly increased demand. With this in mind, we would like to invite you to bring non-perishable foods and/or toiletries along to the Meldrum Church or to our church hall when they are open for our Christmas Tree Display and Craft Event. On Saturday 11th December the church hall will be open from 10am till 4pm and the church will be open from 10am till 2pm. Alternatively, goods can be brought to the church service on Sunday the 12th. These goods will not be in time to be distributed before Christmas but they will replenish stocks for January which is often a 'lean month'.

CHRISTMAS IN CHURCH – Keeping safe:

Covid-19 is still with us and as our Church will be much busier over the Christmas period, we all still need to be very much aware of this.

Over the Christmas period the church will be a lot busier with the many different events and services being held. As people will arrive from different communities when visiting relatives, and with a higher proportion of visitors than normal we have been asked to ensure that there is some form of distancing between people of different households (for the avoidance of doubt a household will also mean two households who are staying together for the Christmas period would form one household and be able to sit together at worship). We ask that you co-operate with our welcoming teams who will help guide you safely to your seat.

Mandatory restrictions:

Face coverings: It is still a **legal requirement** that people wear a face covering when attending a church for worship. Unless people are medically exempt or under the age of 12, everyone needs to wear a face covering when entering and leaving our churches, when they are seated in our pews and when they stand to sing.

NHS Test & Protect: Participation in the NHS Test & Protect strategy is important, both for our Church and for those attending Church but it is not compulsory for individuals to give their details, *however it is legally required of all congregations to participate whenever they engage in hospitality.*

Offering collections: It is still not permissible to pass an offering plate around the congregation during worship. Offerings will be collected as people enter the church building, We encourage you to give your offering electronically if possible, please visit our DONATE page on our website at https://www.meldrumandbourtiechurch.com/donate-online

Non-mandatory actions:

Physical Distancing: The legal requirement of distance within churches has been removed by the Scottish Government; however, it is important to remember that mixing in the community without maintaining physical distancing measures helps the virus to spread widely. It is therefore important that people remain vigilant and follow the guidance from the Scottish Government to keep a physical distance from those in other households.

NHS Test & Protect: In taking part we are joining the national effort to suppress COVID-19 and we will be acting in the best interests of our congregations. However, if people don't want to register their attendance, we cannot force them or deny entry. For those who wish to participate in this strategy whilst attending church we will have on prominent display the **'CHECK in SCOTLAND' QR codes**. We will also have registration cards on each pew for you to complete with name and contact details, if completed please drop into the box provided as you leave the church.

Please also note the following:

If you are experiencing any symptoms of Covid-19 or have been in contact with anyone experiencing these symptoms, please do not come to church

Please arrive in good time as there may be queuing both inside and outside the building

There are hands free sanitiser stations located at the front entrance and at the rear exit door. Please use the hand sanitiser before entering and the sanctuary

Bible readings will be on the screen. You are welcome to bring your own Bible

In the event of a fire, please follow the instructions of the Church officer.

ORDINARY GLORY

By Rev. Lauren Wright Pittman (Inspired by Luke 2:1-20)

In this familiar narrative, what stuck out for me in this reading was the juxtaposition of human and divine, the mundane and extraordinary, the humbleness of a manger and the glory of a multitude of heavenly hosts. I wanted to image this dichotomy with the everyday, intimate, tender scene of new parents and their yawning baby, enveloped by the glittering, awe striking magnificence of God. The holy family is framed by an almond shape called a mandorla. Mandorlas have been used in Christian art to signify the glory of God, and can also represent the intersection and fullness of two things, like heaven and earth or spirit and body. Likely, the most familiar instance of this concept is the shape made between the overlapping circles in a Venn diagram. I wanted to use this shape because this is the moment when human and divine intersect in the person of Jesus, and when the glory of God is birthed into the world. The golden field surrounding the mandorla is filled with my interpretation of the six-winged seraphim from early Christian art, representing the heavenly hosts filling the air with tidings of peace (imaged by olive branches). A seven pointed star hangs over the heads of the family, surrounded by seven other stars, a number that represents completeness.

Cycling Without Age - Oldmeldrum

You might have seen Oldmeldrum's Cycling Without Age (CWA) electric trishaw out and about in the town over the past few months and wondered what it was all about.

CWA is a simple but effective scheme where trained volunteers, provide free outings on the trishaw to people who are elderly, or have limited mobility and who would enjoy getting out into the fresh air. It's more than that, because the trishaws only go at walking speed it's also a social outing as passengers chat to the volunteers and people they see as they pass by. For many it's been shown to really help improve their mental wellbeing.

All outings have two volunteers one to ride the trishaw, the pilot, and one to co-pilot either on their own bike or walking alongside. The co-pilots role is to assist looking after the passengers safety, navigating past obstacles and generally enhancing the whole social experience.

Since coming to Scotland in 2017 more than 55 groups called Chapters have been set up or are in the process of being set up. The Scotlish Charity CWA Scotland website cyclingwithoutage.scot has lots of information for anyone interested in its history or how it's managed nationally.

Here in Oldmeldrum we are a small team of volunteers who give what time we can to fit round family and work commitments. Since we launched our trishaw in June this year we have been able to offer at least one, sometimes two outings a week to residents of Westbank Park Care Home, Wyverie Court and people living in their own homes.

For some of our passengers it's been a chance to see people and areas of Oldmeldrum they haven't seen for a while. The Community Garden at the top of South Road has been a popular destination as has seeing the lovely flower displays in The Square. One passenger wanted to see where they used to live and one trip, albeit without passengers saw the trishaw taken to the top of the viewpoint.

Once a week, teaching staff from Meldrum Academy, along with a small group of pupils riding on their own bikes, have been using trishaw outings as a means of learning about road safety and basic bike maintenance. The pupils chat with the passengers about their lives and stories, learning first hand about social history as they go.

We hope to continue taking the trishaw out when we can over the colder months obviously depending on weather and road conditions.
