GUEST ARTICLE MELDRUM & BOURTIE HERITAGE SOCIETY

Interested in learning more about local history?

Meldrum & Bourtie Heritage Society are seeking new members to join their committee. The Heritage Society was set up in 2000 to "advance the general public's knowledge about the local history of the community". Over the years the Society has been active in the community, with a mix of written articles, photo displays and physical works, among other things. Some examples of the Society's activities are:

- Photo displays of local history at our coffee mornings, at Meldrum Sports and other events. We have approximately 3,000 photos in our database, covering periods back to the 19th century.
- Articles on local events, now published on our website and Facebook page. In the past the Society regularly produced a magazine, Bygone, with a variety of articles in it.
- Creation of the Whin Roadie, a path following the old Oldmeldrum to Banff road, with a viewpoint and information board at the top. This road was the main road to Banff until the current A947 was built in 1804.
- To mark the 700th anniversary of the Battle of Barra, a stone, Bruce's Seat, reputed to have been used by Robert the Bruce when his army defeated John Comyn's army, was moved from Barra Hill to the roundabout at the entrance to the village. An information board was placed by the seat to explain its history.
- Plaques created by the Society noting some significant historic figures from Oldmeldrum can be seen on the Town Hall and Morris's Hotel.
- Creation of a Walking Tour around Oldmeldrum, both as a paper guide and as an audio tour (narrated by Jim McColl).
- Oral Histories were created in 2007 by interviewing 24 local people, as part of the Formartine Oral History Project. These oral histories are available in the main libraries in Formartine, and from the Society.

When the Society started there were 15 committee members. Some stalwarts have been on the committee from the start while others have left and new members joined. Our numbers have dipped recently so we would like to attract new members onto the committee to help revitalise what we do. The time commitment is basically whatever time you would like to put in, we meet every couple of months and beyond that the time commitment depends on what projects you want to be involved in. We're a friendly group, this would be an opportunity to learn more about local history and possibly learn some new skills.

It's the William Forsyth Community Garden, a place which, unfortunately, not all of us know about.



This photo shows the entrance arch and spring flowers looking South on a warm sunny day in spring - something for us to look forward to as we continue to suffer from the winter weather.


Over the next few issues of Connect I and other members of the garden committee will expand on the story of its founding, development, and future of the "hidden gem" that it is today.

Meldrum Meg Way – proposed pathway for walkers and cyclists



A pathway for walkers and cyclists that links Oldmeldrum, Daviot and Inverurie has been a key priority for the community for over 20 years. Meldrum Paths Group have been working hard to meet this priority since the group's establishment in 2012; liaising with the Community Council, Aberdeenshire Council and national government representatives whilst seeking to negotiate a route for the pathway. The work towards developing a pathway, that will benefit the whole community, has taken a major step forward following the commissioning of consultants to undertake a comprehensive review of options for the construction of a safe walking and cycling route linking Oldmeldrum, Inverurie and Daviot.

It is understood that the consultants will carry out Scottish Transport Appraisal Guidance (STAG) assessment which will help to determine a preferred route option by considering a wide range of issues against identified planning objectives.

Since first mooted, over 20 years ago, the demand for a safe walking and cycling routes linking our communities has increased dramatically. The growing awareness of the climate emergency and the need to reduce carbon emissions, the increased demand for alternative travel options for those who do not have access to a car and the significant health benefits for the community as a whole mean that demand for this project is greater than ever. Meldrum Paths Group hope that apart from addressing these issues, the pathway will also provide economic benefits to the local area by encouraging green tourism.



OLDMELDRUM GREEN GROWING SPACE



2024 is well on the way, and there has been a lot of progress made at the Oldmeldrum Green Growing Space allotments. The site is starting to take shape and look like an actual allotment!

We now have an open site with many plotters getting their growing areas prepped for the upcoming season of growing fruits, vegetables, and herbs! Sheds on plots are being painted in bright and inviting colours, with water butts collecting rainwater, raised beds being made, and bean structures and fruit cages being built!

We have a boundary fence and gates in place, site drainage is complete, water pipes are laid, communal paths, and our picnic area under the Christmas tree are well underway. Finally, our most exciting projects, our Polycrub growing tunnels and owl boxes, are now under construction!





We hope to have the

internal fencing and road completed by the end of the spring, and we will be concentrating on our woodland walk area and having the pumpkin patch thriving with rows of orange fruit!

We would also like to say a big thank you to all the residents of the village and the Co-op for their part in helping raise £1783.28 through the Co-op Local Community Fund. This will greatly help with future projects.



A MELDRUM WAR HERO

Among the servicemen from World War II commemorated on Oldmeldrum's War Memorial is Private (Piper) George S. McKay of the 1st Battalion, Gordon Highlanders, who was awarded a posthumous Mention-in-Despatches in recognition of an act of gallantry.

George was born in Oldmeldrum on April 23, 1907 at the Lower Cowgate home of his parents, David and Mary Ann McKay. George was a farmworker before he enlisted in the Gordon Highlanders in December 1924. He later married Susan who was from Banff. His battalion landed in France with the British Expeditionary Force in early September 1939. The accompanying picture shows a trench-digging party from the 1st Gordons returning to barracks while led by a piper as officers look on at Templeuve, near Lille, in northern France, on October 10, 1939.



The 1st Gordons were transferred from the 1st Division to the 51st (Highland) Division in 1940 and at the time of the German breakthrough were in the Maginot Line with that Division. The 1st Gordons successfully attacked the German lines in Cambron Woods and the spur overlooking Cambron, near Abbeville, on June 4. The well-sited enemy machine-gun posts hampered their attack although the Gordons were eager to go on. However, the Germans began pushing the Division along its whole front. The 51st Division fought its way back from the Somme until it was surrounded and capitulated at St Valery-en-Caux on June 12.

George was among the 10,000 men made prisoners of war. He was later held in Stalag XXA camp at Thorn, now Torun, in Poland. He had the misfortune of being shot dead by a German guard when he tried to escape while doing agricultural work at nearby Borowke camp on November 28, 1941. His grave is at Malbork Commonwealth War Cemetery in Poland. On April 6, 1944, he was awarded a posthumous Mention-in-Despatches in recognition of his brave but ill-fated attempt to escape. He was unfortunate as most escapees were recaptured and punished with solitary confinement and bread and water for rations.

There were at least four other Oldmeldrum-born soldiers serving with the Gordons who were captured by the Germans during the Battle of France and later held in prisoner-of-war camps. They were Private William Bruce, aged 21; Private James Glennie, aged 27, who was captured on May 20 at Ath, Belgium; Lance Corporal David Duncan, aged 32, of the 1st Battalion, and Lance Corporal Alexander Hill, aged 30, who were both captured at St Valery-en-Caux. They all spent the rest of the war in POW camps.

The 12th Battalion, Royal Warwickshire Regiment, was fortunate to be evacuated from France and was later based at Oldmeldrum from January to March 1941. A year earlier the battalion had been sent to France, where it guarded the rear echelons until ordered to withdraw with the rest of the BEF,

and was evacuated from Brest and St Malo on June 16/17, 1940 without a single casualty.




Meldrum Parish Church Community Survey Feedback



It is clear that our current buildings – Meldrum Church and the Albert Road Church Hall – are not totally fit for purpose, however we need to also ensure that what we think the purpose is, actually reflects what the community need and as much as possible, takes account of the importance that certainly the main Church building has for the community.




Many of the respondents felt that as a Church, we should be open more often to provide Quiet Space and Pastoral Support. This is something we will definitely look at – we would dearly love to be able to provide this kind of support and space for the people of Meldrum. However, we also have to be realistic as to how possible it would be to create private and more flexible spaces in both buildings. We also need to know how we could ensure that we develop a team of people to help facilitate this.

In terms of how our church operates and supports the whole Meldrum community, your comments generated the words shown below. The stand out words certainly give us food for thought as an encouragement and challenge alike. Alongside this, it is heartening to hear how strongly many of you feel about this building as a key part of the Meldrum community and heritage.




In terms of the Church Hall on Albert Road, it is clear – both from the survey responses and from just seeing the space – that this is a well-used Hall, however we do know there is potential for much more community activity either there or in a new space. What has also become clear – again both from the survey and from speaking with some of you – is that there are some in the community who didn't realise this was the Church Hall but that it was the local community hall. Those people are not wrong – it is the local community hall. It's just that the building is owned by the Church! However, as a Church, we are very much focused on supporting the local community and making this hall available for local groups for as low as cost as is practical, is one way we can do that. Many of you also commented that you weren't actually sure what was going on in the hall on a regular basis, which is something we will look to address in conjunction with the other groups using the space.



Your responses about what you attend or have attended in the Church Hall, show how varied the activities are in there, which may also be of help for those who didn't know:

In the survey, we made some suggestions about things that could happen or be developed at the Church Hall. Your responses provide a clear response for upgrading the facilities, as well as some really helpful suggestions for things that you felt were missing in the community at present.




In your comments regarding options for the Church Hall, you made various suggestions – mostly around different items that needed upgrading, but also how you saw its future usage. Again, these reflect the need to upgrade these facilities or look for other options in the Community.



The biggest issue at stake, is what the future community presence of Meldrum Parish Church look likes. Obviously, our Church building is well respected and has been the site of many key moments in the lives of many of you in this community. But the building is out of the way and we are very limited in options for its redevelopment. The Albert Road Hall has less of a significance, however it still plays an important role as a space for the community to gather for social, physical, wellbeing and spiritual activities. But it has no parking, needs a significant upgrade, and doesn't meet all the identified needs.

And so, we raised the previously discussed proposal for a new development off Urquhart Road, to provide a Church and Community building that is fit for purpose now and will look to the needs of the future Meldrum community, as well as respecting the history of Meldrum Parish Church in the past.

52% were in favour of considering this (when taking agree and strongly agree together), and 26% were against. And around 73% of you were in favour of seeing a mix of large and small space for maximum community benefit, however, we have to bear in mind that some of these respondents may have been suggesting this for existing spaces, rather than for building something new. So this is something that we will continue to explore, so that we can ensure that the Church is a meaningful presence in, and support of, the local community for many years to come.



Next Steps

- We will firstly explore further the costs involved with developing a new Church and Community facility that is fit for purpose to meet as many needs as possible. We have drawings and costings from before Covid, so need to revisit those and understand our options.
- We will then explore options for the Albert Road Church Hall especially in terms of heating and decoration.
- Our final option would be to look at anything we can do with the main Meldrum Church, especially in terms of removing pews to provide a more flexible venue, looking at creation of smaller rooms, and upgrading heating.

We would love to discuss this further with you, and so we invite you to our next Connect Café on Saturday 9 March at which we will have some displays of options, and be on hand to chat with you.


We had a great response to the survey and it was wonderful to see the interest from the community. We have attached the

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

The Trishaw is garaged in the premises at Westbank Home which is very convenient as quite a number of our passengers are residents of Westbank Home. Our Pilots (trained drivers) and Co-Pilots take great pleasure in transporting residents and staff as well as other members of our elderly citizens for outings around the town. Some of our regular routes include the William Forsyth Community Garden, Coutens Farm, The Pleasure Park, and dare we say an enjoyable stopover at the Visitors Center Glengarioch Distillery where the staff invariably entertain our passengers with a welcome dram. Other welcome stopovers are the ice cream shop on Commercial Road, a fly piece at Nicky T's, and a Coffee stop at Hoodles.



As a result we are currently seeking someone to take on role of Administrator who would be responsible for coordinating and arranging outings between passengers and the Pilot volunteers.









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
