Welcome to the June edition of Meldrum Connect.

Thank you for the enthusiasm shown for the March magazine and for the flood of new articles supplied.

Our Guest Article, from Andrew McCartney, is all about the early days of Meldrum Amenities Improvement Group, ('MAIG'). How they have grown, from 2002, to produce lovely light displays and from an early "primitive operation", to the wonderful and professional flower displays we see now.

There is also the story of how the Garioch Distillery and Meldrum House were used by various company's and regiments during World War 2.

If you are a vintage car enthusiast you will learn that, as far back as 1964, a group of former Inverurie Academy pupils (remember that Meldrum Academy only opened in 2002) and some enthusiasts from Oldmeldrum resolved to form a motor club, that eventually resulted in the creation of the Garioch Vehicle Restoration Society.

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Cycling Without Age started in Denmark in 2012, with the aim of helping older people and those with limited mobility, including children, to get outside and enjoy being in the fresh air. There are now 50 groups across Scotland and we have volunteers running one right here in Meldrum.

On the subject of bikes, Oldmeldrum Community E-Bikes (a project by Meldrum Paths Group) have several e-bikes for hire, to help you to commute locally or to get out into our outstanding Aberdeenshire countryside. All for just £25 a week.

The Oldmeldrum Community Pantry continues to operate out of the Royal British Legion – see their new opening times inside.

The Community Council have been busy and have once again employed our Town Orderly to keep Meldrum looking good. They

have also recently replaced batteries and pads for the Oldmeldrum Square defibrillator at a cost of over £500! They held a Bingo Evening in Daviot Village Hall to help raise funds for these projects.

As you can see there is great work going on all the time for the benefit of Meldrum Community.

Meldrum Amenities Improvement Group (MAIG) – How it all began by Andrew McCartney

MAIG formed in September 2002, when the population of Oldmeldrum was ~ 1500. Oldmeldrum has now doubled to 3200! Current and planned building developments will see a further expansion.

How it all started,

The founder committee members were Margaret Robertson, the late Nan Greczylo, the late William Law, Frank Mathers, Andrew McCartney and shortly afterward Sandy Dunbar, Harry Duncan and David Shand joined to make up the committee.

At our first meeting, it was decided we should provide Christmas Illumination for the town and a race night allowed us to purchase 8 lights for the town centre.

We then decided to go about brightening up the town during the summer months. By today's standards, when I think back, this was quite a primitive operation. In the early years plants were received as mature plants from Aberdeenshire Councils Nursery, at Aden Park, Mintlaw and kindly transported in open lorry and trailer courtesy of Raymond Scorgie.

The late Norman Duguid kindly allowed us to use the area of the old mart (now Otter Avenue) to transfer the plants into the baskets which were hung out on an "A" frame to 'establish' in the open air (no Polytunnels in those days), which were then put out on display in time (hopefully) for Meldrum Sports.

We had much support from local businesses, such as Monyana Engineering, now Fishers Offshore, who constructed and donated a purpose-built water bowser, which for a few years was towed with a tractor hired from Aberdeenshire Council, until such time as we were able to purchase our own second-hand tractor. Others who offered support were Grampian Steel Services and the Webster family who stored our equipment and gave valuable assistance throughout the year.

During the summer months, water for the flowers was taken from the Mill Burn, at the bottom of Mill Road, until eventually by kind permission of the Davidson family we were able to obtain a water supply from Meldrum Motors and secure garaging for our tractor and water bowser.

Our tenure at the old mart site was for the first 2 years until Lesley and Norman Gill kindly offered the group their steading buildings at Foresterhill Farm, on the outskirts of the town, on the Methlick road. This new location allowed us to erect the "A" frames in an old building without a roof which gave protection to the growing plants. Eventually, we were able to up our game by purchasing a second hand Polytunnel from the old tree nurseries at Tillicorthie close to Udny, and with the help of Grampian Steel Services the frames were removed, transported, modified, and erected on an old building foundation at Foresterhill Farm. This new facility made such a difference and eventually, we were able to install a heating system through grant funding from the Formartine Area Committee which allowed us to expand and develop our summer displays. Meanwhile we continued to organise fundraising events and with each passing year were able to expand on our Christmas light programme whilst at the same time promoting our "Best Christmas" dressed Retail premises competition which each year is sponsored by Meldrum House Hotel. Over the years the retail premises have put on a great display but probably the best one was Dot & Jim Davidsons efforts when their whole window display at Meldrum Motors for their Nativity creation made up of straw bales with Mary in the Manger and the baby Jesus in the crib, angels etc and in the back ground the late

Jim had wired up an electric motor with a mouse connected to a continuous wire with the mouse scuttling through the Manger at regular intervals. Brilliant!

In the next edition of Meldrum Connect I will continue the development of MAIG to the present day.

Meldrum Bourtie & Daviot Community Council

May 2023.

Our tree planting event to commemorate Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee went well on the 4th March. The Lord Lieutenant for Aberdeenshire, Sandy Manson, officiated and was ably assisted by our special guest, Jim McColl. It was a cool morning but that did not dampen the great community spirit.

A Local Development Plan sub group exists for discussion, awareness and to work on our responses for the 2028 plan.

We invited Police Scotland to our March meeting. P.C. Davis attended to discuss issues in our community. We asked members, councillors and members of the public to submit questions and concerns prior to the meeting. The topics covered included vandalism, speeding traffic in Meldrum and Daviot, anti-social behaviour, inappropriate and inconsiderate parking of vehicles and some cases of theft. P.C. Davis suggested an increase in police patrols and the Early Intervention Officer revisiting schools. A special meeting was held in The Swingle Suite to discuss Fyvie/Oldmeldrum Medical Practice. Alex Pirrie and Aileen Wilson from Aberdeenshire Health and Social Care Partnership attended. They were invited to discuss the change of management at Fyvie/Oldmeldrum Medical Group when Aberdeenshire Health and Social Care Partnership take over the running of the practice.

Zero Carbon Daviot held a successful Sustainable Travel Event in Daviot Hall on Saturday the 1st April. Meldrum 2030 held its second successful Market Day on the 29th March. The next one will be a Market Evening on the 28th June. Trying to keep on top of litter, particularly in The Square, is a big job! We are happy to be able to employ our town orderly again this year. We have recently replaced batteries and pads for the Oldmeldrum Square defibrillator at a cost of over £500. We maintain a number of these and to help with this expense we plan to hold a couple of fundraising events. The first was a bingo evening in Daviot Village Hall on the 19th May

and a Meldrum event will take place later this year.

We keep monitoring new housing development work and act accordingly if we feel issues need to be addressed. Recently a Meldrum Health Check by Aberdeenshire Council was carried out. The Community Council, Meldrum 2030 and the L.D.P. sub group will be discussing this and share views and information. There are public meetings planned to revisit past Meldrum and Daviot Future Vision Reports when members of the public will be able to make suggestions and discuss what they feel is important in their town or village.

New information finger posts have been erected in both the small and large town squares in Oldmeldrum. These give useful and interesting information. They were paid for by Developer Obligations.

We have had lengthy involvement and discussion around bus service provision for Oldmeldrum and the surrounding area but in particular regarding Daviot. Now that the Ready 2 Go bus service is no longer available, Daviot finds it has a very limited bus timetable and residents feel cut off and unfairly treated. The Formartine Bus Forum is restarting this year and a representative will voice these concerns. An Aberdeenshire Council spokesperson was unable to attend a recent Community Council meeting to discuss this subject.

Cycling Without Age

Have you seen Oldmeldrum's electric trishaw Meldrum Meg out and about again now the weather has started to warm up?

For those of you who might not know Cycling Without Age (CWA) started in Denmark in 2012 with the aim of helping older people , people with limited mobility including children get outside to enjoy being in the fresh air.

The charity spread across many countries coming to Scotland in 2017 when a group in Falkirk saw its potential for improving the lives of people living in the area.

There are now well over 50 groups, called Chapters across Scotland with trained cyclists known as pilots.

The trishaws travel at walking speed so each outing is more than a bike ride, its a whole social experience for passengers talking to people they meet, chatting with the pilots and telling their stories about their lives. There is no cost to passengers so the scheme is available to anyone.

A few people in Oldmeldrum heard about the trishaws and after raising the necessary funds through donations and grants, and getting volunteers trained in how to manage it, our trishaw was launched in summer 2021.

We find that our passengers often ask to be taken up to the Community Garden on South Road to see the lovely views over the hills, or go round The Square to see and smell the beautiful flowers or maybe visit parts of Oldmeldrum they haven't seen for a while.


Very often the outings go on a wee detour stopping outside the coffee shop or for an ice-cream.

The trips out need to be arranged in advance, are weather dependent and last about half an hour or so. Because the main roads are so busy the trishaw doesn't go outside Oldmeldrum.

Military Meldrum

Armed Forces Day will be celebrated this year on Saturday, June 24, when we have the chance to celebrate the service of men and women in the British Armed Forces. During World War II, soldiers were a familiar sight in Oldmeldrum where they were based for training before eventually going off

to fight overseas. Among the earliest Army units to be billeted in the town were the gunners of 127 (Highland) Field Regiment, Royal Artillery, which was commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel C.H.D. Springfield.

The regiment had been raised at Arbroath in August 1940 and on October 24 that year, it opened its HQ at Meldrum House, which also accommodated the officers' mess, after moving from Inverurie. The HQs of 301 and 304 Batteries were based at Glengarioch Distillery, where whisky production had been suspended during the war, while D troop of 304 Battery moved to Fintray House for the



defence of RAF Dyce until returning to Meldrum a month later. A Norwegian battery was attached to the regiment while at Meldrum.

Oldmeldrum resident Jim Presly, who was a schoolboy at the time, recalled that the soldiers' mess was on the malt barns' ground floor while the other floors had bunk-beds where the men slept. The Army cooks would often give Jim and his pals something tasty to eat. There was also a NAAFI canteen in Distillery Road.

Gunnery practice was important to keep the gunners on their toes and shoots took place at the Cabrach, the Sands of Forvie, near Newburgh, and the Culbin Sands, near Findhorn. Other exercises were held with the 5th/7th Gordons and 5th Black Watch of 153 Infantry Brigade, part of the reformed 51st Highland Division. The regiment began to exchange its old field guns for more modern equipment including the quick-firing 25 pounder gun-howitzer and the 4.5in howitzer. All the training and exercises in Scotland and England were put into practice in the campaigns that would lead to ultimate victory. The 127 Field Regiment supported 153 Infantry Brigade from the Second Battle of El Alamein in October 1942 through North Africa, Sicily, France, Belgium, the Netherlands and Germany to VE Day.



Among other soldiers to be billeted in Oldmeldrum was Ellon man Peter Rennie, who was serving with D Company, 8th Battalion, Gordon Highlanders, in the summer of 1941 and whose wartime experiences were recorded for the Gordon Highlanders Museum in Aberdeen. He helped man a machine-gun post in a concrete pillbox on the north bank of the River Ythan's mouth at Newburgh. They also laid mines on the riverbanks, while guided by the Royal Engineers, and set out barbed wire to keep out members of the public. He didn't think the minefield was a success because when the tide came in some of the mines used to strike each other and explode.

In the winter of 1941-42, D Coy was billeted in Glengarioch's malt barns and it was while there that they learned their battalion was to be converted to a new role and be designated 100th Anti-Tank Regiment, Royal Artillery (Gordon Highlanders), and was destined for India. Peter, now a sergeant, sailed to India in 1943 and served at Ledo airfield in Assam, where he helped guard and load supplies which were flown to the Allied forces fighting the Japanese in China. From August 1944, his regiment joined the offensive against the Japanese in Burma.

Garioch Vehicle Restoration Society - by Michael Watt & Tom Sked

In 1964 a group of former Inverurie Academy pupils and some enthusiasts from Oldmeldrum resolved to form a motor club.

On 27th January 1965 the first recorded meeting of the club was held and a Committee appointed. Only 4 days later the first event was held in Kemnay. Several other Rally events followed in July 1965 and the name "Garioch Motor Club" was adopted. During August of the same year the first Vintage Rally was held and 12 vehicles took part. These were the beginnings of the now wellestablished annual rally. The aim of the "G M C Old Vehicle section" was to provide a service to restorers and those interested in old vehicles and their preservation. The name adopted in November 1967 was the "GMC Vehicle Restoration Section". The first news sheet featured a sketch, which became the basis of the present club Badge and was printed the same month by Tom Sked, a founder member, who has provided much of this history. In 1968 the office bearers met with the Stonehaven Town Council representatives to discuss the achievements of Stonehaven's forgotten inventor- R W Thomson and the Thomson Memorial Fellowship was born. Steps were taken in November 1969 to break away from the GMC to make way for the go ahead" Strathbogie car club". While the Garioch

Motor Club itself died a death, it gave birth to two healthy babies "Garioch Vehicle Restoration Society " and the "Thomson Memorial Fellowship " Today the Garioch Vehicle Restoration Society and attracts a large turnout of vehicles to the annual rally. The aims of the club have not changed since they were established at the first meeting held in 1964, with the priority being given to the encouragement of preservation, restoration and maintenance of public interest in veteran, vintage and post-vintage vehicles. The rally this year will be held as usual on Sunday 6th August in the pleasure park. We have only had to cancel the rally once due to bad weather and twice due to the recent pandemic. During the year we arrange visits to places of interest which is well supported by club members. I was lucky enough this year to visit Dean Cemetery in Edinburgh to R W Thomson's gravestone. On Rally Day we have a display from the "Thomson Memorial Fellowship". They have discovered a huge amount about the Stonehaven inventor.





Oldmeldrum SWI

Did you know there's been a Women's Institute in Oldmeldrum for over 90 years? Affectionately known as 'the rural', the Scottish Women's Rural Institute began in Meldrum in April 1927 with a basket making demonstration. Fast forward to May 2023 when our speaker Cat Dalzell, the basket maker behind Bramblethorn Baskets, will be showing us all how to weave stars from the willow she grows!

With an emphasis on fellowship, crafts and homemaking skills, the Scottish Women's Institute (or SWI as it's now known) retains the ethos of the past whilst acknowledging the present and embracing the future. The organisation aims to connect women locally and nationally to improve their quality of life through education, friendship, sharing and having fun.

During session 2022/23, at Oldmeldrum SWI, we've learned about running a small business soap making from 'Essentially You' Soaps at Ellon, been taught how to use a defibrillator by the Community Resilience Facilitator from the Scottish Ambulance Service, and the Garioch Community Kitchen helped us make more of our slow cookers to create healthy, thrifty meals. We've had talks about the Book of Deer textile banners, the allotments being developed in our village by Oldmeldrum Green Growing Space, and the art of furniture restoration by Newburgh's Cottack Workshop. Rounding off this session's programme in June we are visiting Ellon Castle Gardens for a guided tour.

Aberdeenshire Council supply Bedding Plants and they buy in 500. They also grow their own Plants from seed. They are given the land from the Golf Club and in return any surplus electricity from the Solar Panels is returned.

The Golf Club also donate the Christmas Tree for the Square. Barbara gave us an account month by month of the activities of M.A.I.G. including the Monthly Draw. It was a very interesting talk and appreciation was shown for the dedication and hard work of the Volunteers.



The Guild AGM was held on 10 April 2023. Kathy gave a short talk on the Business of The Guild and an update on upcoming events and our Outing. The Speaker was Pat Patrone who spoke on the theme "Wee Seeds Big Trees".

She spoke about different kinds of seeds, size, shape and colour and each seed is a miracle as it grows. Charities grow from "Wee Seeds to Big Trees" as we have seen in projects such as Mary's Meals, Maggies, The Vine Trust, Air Ambulance, Guide Dogs, ARI Garden and Christian Aid. Pat made up 10 packs of seeds and we had to guess the name of the seeds in the pack. On a personal note Pat reflected on her recent holiday to Japan and told us about when Christians were persecuted and crucified and how Christianity has survived and grown. It was a very interesting talk and enjoyed by all.
